The John Muir Festival will take place between the 17th-26th April, with a series of events around West Lothian to celebrate the life of the famous man, as well as to celebrate the opening up of the new national pathway across Scotland which is named after him. John Muir (1838 – 1914) was born in Dunbar and emigrated to Wisconsin at 11 years old. He became very well known for his love of the outdoors and is considered the pioneer of modern ecology. The festival in West Lothian starts with Finders Eaters at Polkemmet Country Park on 17th April, then on Saturday 19th you can head to Almondell Country Park for some Easter willow weaving with the Rural Connect team. The John Muir Festival celebrations will take place at Linlithgow peel on Thursday 24th April, between 9:30am - 11:30am, come along to learn more about John Muir, learn how to make seed bombs and get involved with more nature activities. New Plants. An ideal time just now fro you to look round the garden centres and plant suppliers to see what they have on offer at present. Many of the plants will be in pots and have a label with them showing size and preferred position — make sure that you read these as many people buy in haste and repent a couple of years later when they have a giant lavatera or forsythia bush spreading out over a large part of the garden and blocking out other plants.
