1. Updates from Churches

St Andrew's, Dundee have been looking at the use of plastic water bottles, involving their Family Project (see http://www.standrewsparishchurch.co.uk/Project/Index.htm) in food waste and exploring if it would be possible to introduce a composting system. They also have a programme of monthly outdoor activity walks and run a regular Traidcraft stall.

St Bride's, Monifeith (St Ann's Carnoustie and St Thomas', Arbroath) have been active in collecting for Mary's Meals Backpack project, which aims to provide children who don't have them with the basic tools for learning (see https://www.marysmeals.org.uk/get-involved/the-backpack-project/). Their recent Harvest Festival also provided food for those in need in Dundee.

Arbroath Old and Abbey Church are trying to ensure food waste from the church is being correctly separated and recycled. They have just persuaded Angus Council to provide the church with food waste bins and the Eco Group is trying to ensure they are used properly. They also took part in the local Beach Clean in August.

Auchterhouse (linked with Monikie & Newbigging and Murroes & Tealing) struggle to get real interest in caring for creation issues but they are setting up a twinning arrangement with another church, which it is hoped will bring more involvement through global outreach. They have changed to china cups instead of disposable ones, now they have new facilities in the church to allow washing up. Their manse and glebe land was sold and there appeared to be an opportunity to build a new eco manse but the Church of Scotland didn't seem able to go for it!
